Feeling Frustrated? How to Advocate for Yourself

When student don't have the information and skills they need to find their way in the college setting and don't know how to advocate for themselves, they may not get good grades and many of them leave without completing their degrees. By learning to advocate for yourself, you have a better chance of college success!

Advocating for yourself means understanding your strengths and weaknesses, developing personal goals, standing up for yourself, and handling conflict like an adult. It also means communicating your needs and making decisions about the supports necessary to meet those needs.

Once you learn to advocate for yourself, you're going to have an easier time with your classes and getting the support you need. It will give more control and direction to your life outside of school too.

Seven Steps to Advocating for Yourself:

- 1. Believe in yourself and your abilities the first step is to believe that you deserve to be advocated for.
- Remember that nobody's a mind reader your instructors and the college staff cannot read your mind. You can't assume that anyone knows what your problems or needs are – you have to speak up for yourself.
- Know what you need make a list of what you need to know or receive to be successful. This will help you articulate what is important to you.

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- 4. **Know where to go to get what you need** who is most likely to have the power, knowledge, or ability to provide what you need? For college issues, the TRIO SSS staff is a good starting point.
- 5. Figure out when and where to address your issue try to approach people when they are able to give you their full attention, rather than when they are multi-tasking or interacting with someone else. It is best to choose a place where the other person will feel comfortable. For example, your instructor or an advisor might not want to have a long talk in the hallway, but he or she might offer to meet with you during their available office hours.
- 6. Clearly ask for what you need if you don't know what you need, please see a TRIO SSS staff member. We will be more than happy to meet with you to get to the heart of the issue.
- 7. Put a game plan in place once you have received an answer to your request, make a list of steps to tackle the problem from the first action to the resolution. Make these steps clear, single action steps that build on each other. Be sure to give yourself timelines and hold yourself accountable for these action items.
